

CASE STORY

Our story is called:

The Case of the Rotten Wretch.

As you listen to the story, see if you can figure out:

- 1. Who was the rotten wretch? What was so rotten about him?
- 2. How did he change from being a wretch?

This story doesn't take place in Bible times. It starts out around 1730 in Warring, England.

Not far from the docks of the River Thames, where the great merchant ships unloaded their rich cargo from around the world, there lived a young mother named Elizabeth Newton and her only child, John. Anyone could see from looking at her that Elizabeth was sick. Her weak, thin body and terrible, cough pointed to one thing: consumption—or tuberculosis, as we call it today. There was no cure for it back then. It was only a matter of time until she would die.

Little John was only six years old, but he could see was happening to his mother's body. But there was something else about her that he noticed, too: love, peace and joy. He knew she loved God with all her heart—and, that she wanted him to love God, too. She was determined to fill his little mind and heart with as much about God as she could, before she died.

While just a baby, Elizabeth began to sing hymns to John. When he was three, she taught him to read the Bible. She gave him Bible verses and the godly sayings that Isaac Watts had written for children to memorize: Sayings like: 'Good children must, Fear God all day; Love Christ always; Parents, obey, In secret, pray; No false thing say; mind; little play; By no sin stray; make no delay, in doing good.' John was a quick learner and Elizabeth a persistent teacher. Soon many of these sayings and verses were planted in his mind.

Of all the things Elizabeth wanted to make sure John knew before she died, she wanted him to know the gospel most of all. "We are all sinners in need of a Savior, John," she had told him. Back in the beginning, Adam and Eve knew perfect fellowship with God. They knew God and loved Him and obeyed Him. But Satan led some of the angels to rebel against God; then, he tempted Adam and Eve to rebel against God, too. Adam and Eve broke fellowship with God and chose to do things their own way, instead. They deserved death---God's punishment for sin. But God is so rich in mercy, so amazing in grace that He sent His

that He sent His Son Jesus to defeat Satan and pay for the sins of all who would turn from their sins and trust Him as their Savior, "she told him.

"John, like Adam and Eve, we have also rebelled against God," she said. "But also like them, He has not left us without hope. God calls each of us to make: a choice to keep living a life in rebellion against Him; or, to turn from our sins, trust in Jesus and be forgiven. We can be God's dearly loved people!"

"John, I pray that you will choose to trust in Jesus and grow up one day to encourage others to choose Him, too," she urged him.

Day after day, Elizabeth kept teaching her little son, until at last her weak body gave out and she died-- just two weeks before little John's seventh birthday.

How terrible it must have been for John to lose his dear mother at such a young age! But how much worse it was for John, since his father--a sea captain--was thousands of miles away in the Mediterranean Sea, loading his merchant ship with spices, cloth, and tea. And he would not be home for months!

Even when his father did get home, life became so very different for little John. The captain loved his little boy, but he did not love God as his wife had. Now, there was no one to take John to church or read the Bible to him. There was no who cared what kind of friends he played with or that he went to school at all. On John's eleventh birthday, his father took him out of school and brought him to live on his merchant ship.

Life on the sea was exciting, but it wasn't good for John. The sailors taught John to curse and do many other bad things. John knew these things were sinful, but he did them anyway. Soon he even loved doing them. In his heart, John still remembered all his mother had taught him: "Turn from your sins, trust in Jesus as our Savior." But John kept on rebelling. He turned away from God and tried to turn others away from Him, too.

After six years sailing with his father, John began to work as a sailor on other ships. With each ship, John's behavior became worse. He made up mocking songs about his captains and would sing them to their face. Not satisfied with regular cuss words, John thought up new ones. The other men called him the "Great Blasphemer" for the awful way he would curse God. John did whatever he could to tempt others to sin, too.

John quickly made enemies. Once, he tried to run away

from his ship, only to be caught and punished. The captain treated John so terribly that John talked him into making him the servant of a slave trader in Africa—about as wicked of a job as a man could have--just to get away from the cruel captain.

And what about all John's mother had taught him about God? Had he forgotten it all now? God would have been just to let John never more remember all his mother taught him about God; but in His amazing grace, God kept bringing it to mind--especially during his many, near-death accidents. Once, a horse bucked him off his back and John landed just inches from a huge spike that would have gone right through his body and killed him. Another time, John arrived just moments too late to board a small boat with his friends, only to see the boat sink and his friends all drown. Yet another time, John was mistreated and left to die by the slave trader's wife--but rescued just in time. Each time, the Lord brought his mother's words to mind: "Turn from your sins, trust in Jesus as our Savior."

Each time John almost died, he thought about the punishment he deserved from God for his sinful rebellion and the choice he could make to receive God's amazing grace. But John kept going back to his sinful ways. It seemed John would never change.

Before long, John faced death again. This time, there really seemed no way out. John was sailing home to England on The Greyhound, a great merchant ship filled with beeswax and dyer's wood from Africa. Once more John was up to his bad ways. He refused to do any work. He cursed God in such terrible ways that even the sailors were shocked. And then when he found out that the captain was a Christian, he mocked him and tried to get him to sin. Soon, everyone hated John. They wondered how they would endure the seven thousand mile journey home with him!

Thoughts of John were soon forgotten when a ferocious storm suddenly struck one night. Wham! Bang! A huge jolt woke John awake. A giant wave had slammed into the side of the ship. Water poured into the ship's belly. Before long the ship would sink!

"All men to the pumps! We've got to get this water out or we are sure to sink!" the captain ordered.

The world was God's; and what happened in it, only happened according to God's good, unfailing plan. Even from the day that Adam and Eve had rebelled, thousands of years ago, God had promised a day would come when a Son of Eve would come to crush Satan's power over sin and death. The first Adam had brought sin and death to all by his sin; but this Son of Eve would come like a second Adam to defeat Satan and bring the promise of eternal life to all who would trust in Him. Satan kept alert for the coming of this Son of Eve, this Second Adam. God had promised.

Satan knew when his enemy, the promised Son of Eve, the Second Adam, had come. It was the unforgettable night we call Christmas. That night, the brilliant glory of the LORD suddenly shone down upon shepherds in a field outside of Bethlehem. A great host of angels broke into praise, making the glad announcement that the Savior has been born, who was Jesus Christ, the Lord. And how could Satan have missed the shimmering, new star that appeared in the sky, leading Magi from their home faraway in the East to worship the young child, Jesus. These signs were simply too great! This Jesus was the promised One who came to crush him and his rule over this world, just as God had promised.

Satan knew he must destroy Jesus before Jesus could crush him. Surely Satan was hopeful when jealous King Herod, upon hearing about Jesus from the Magi, sent soldiers into Bethlehem to kill him. Perhaps Jesus would be taken care of this way...but no! Nothing would stop God's good, unfailing plans! In a dream, God had warned

Mary God's good, unfailing plans! In a dream, God had warned Joseph of Herod's evil plan. He escaped to Egypt with Mary and little Jesus before the soldiers stormed into Bethlehem. Jesus lived. Satan would have make another plan if he were to defeat this Son of Eve, this Second Adam.

Many years passed and Jesus grew into a man. At last the time had come for Him to tell the good news of salvation to all who would hear. He was baptized by John in the River Jordan, then the Spirit led Him out into the wilderness to prepare for this great task.

For forty days--or six weeks-- Jesus prayed and fasted. Can you imagine praying and not eating food for six weeks out in the hot, dry wilderness? As you can guess, Jesus was very weak and tired by the end of that time... and Satan noticed. What better time to tempt Jesus—the Second Adam-- to sin than when He was tired and hungry. "If you're the Son of God, turn these rocks into bread," Satan said. Jesus was so hungry! How tempting it was to use God's power to fill His empty stomach.

Then Satan took Jesus to the top of the Temple and told Him, "Throw Yourself off the side of the Temple; let the angels catch You. What better way could you prove to everyone that you are the Son of God?" Satan whispered. Jesus was tempted by Satan's idea. He knew that He would face the unbelief of many when He told them He was the Son of God. That would be so hard!

Then Satan showed Jesus all the nations of the world and promised Him, "If You will bow down and worship me, I will give You all of the world."

How tempting! To win the worship of the world without suffering and dying on the cross for the sins of God's people! Jesus knew He would suffer terribly if He fulfilled His Father's plan of salvation.

Satan had chosen his temptations well. Which would Jesus choose? To be dissatisfied with God's will for Him, like Adam had been, and rebel against God's way? Satan hoped so. This Son of Eve, this Second Adam must sin, if Satan was to prevent Him from crushing his head and saving God's people.

But, no! Jesus would not give in to temptation. He chose to be satisfied in God and His good ways. Hunger pangs, the insults of unbelieving people and even the terrible suffering He would face doing God's will were better than any easy way out Satan was offering Him. Satan had tempted the First Adam into rebelling against God, but not this Second Adam. Jesus resisted Satan.

"Be gone, Satan! Man does not live on bread alone, but on the Word of God: I will make no bread from rocks!" Jesus told him. And then He said: "God's Word tells us we should not put Him to the test...I will not jump off the Temple to prove who I am!" Then he finished off Satan by saying: "God is alone to be worshiped: I will not bow to you! Leave Me alone!"

Defeated, Satan slunk away and God sent angels to give Jesus food and comfort. The tricks that had fooled the first Adam, did not work on Jesus, the second Adam. Satan had lost yet again.

But Satan did not give up. He continued to get at Jesus, however he could...even through Jesus' closest friends. One day, when Jesus told His disciples that He would suffer and die on the cross, then be raised from the dead to save God's people, Satan stirred up Peter to try to stop Him:"'Never, Lord!' he said. 'This shall never happen to you!" (Matthew 16:22)

Peter might have meant only to protect His beloved Master from pain, but Jesus saw in his words another of Satan's attempts to make Him dissatisfied with God's good plans. Jesus turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; you do not have in mind the things of God, but the things of men." (Matthew 16:23) Jesus refused to rebel against what His Father had planned. He chose to be satisfied in God and His good ways. He would rather suffer God's way than avoid the cross.

Later, Satan stirred up Judas Iscariot to betray Jesus and have Him handed over to the Jewish leaders for money, even though Judas knew Jesus had done no wrong. Even as Jesus hung dying on the cross, Satan stirred up the crowd against Jesus to sin against His Father's plan:

"Those who passed by hurled insults at him, shaking their heads and saying, 'You who are going to destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! Come down from the cross, if you are the Son of God!' In the same way the chief priests, the teachers of the law and the elders mocked him. 'He saved others,' they said, 'but he can't save himself! He's the King of Israel! Let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God. Let God rescue him now if he wants him, for he said, 'I am the Son of God.' In the same way the robbers who were crucified with him also heaped insults on him." (Matthew 27:39-44)

Jesus knew that there was truth in these mocking words.

P.3

He was the Son of God. He could get down from the cross, if He wanted to. Satan hoped these mean words would be more than Jesus could bear; but they were not. Jesus chose to suffer God's way rather than prove who He was to these people. No! He would not give in to temptation! He would not rebel against God! No matter what!

No. There was nothing that Satan could do to tempt this Son of Eve, this second Adam to rebel against God as Adam had in the beginning. He would choose to be satisfied in God and His good ways. He had come to bring salvation to God's people; and He would do it, just as God had promised He would. So Jesus hung there on the cross and offered up His perfect life to God, His Father, as the perfect sacrifice for the sins of all who would ever turn and trust in Him.

Who was that son? Jesus, the Son of God! He would live the perfect life that Adam and Eve should have lived, but did not. On the cross, He would offer it up as the perfect payment for the sins of all those who would ever turn from their sins and trust in Him as their Savior. God, Himself, would satisfy His justice so that He could show us mercy!

Our story today takes place thousands of years ago, not long after the creation of the world, on the most terrible day of history.

Life had been wonderful in the garden God had planted for Adam and Eve. And why wouldn't it have been? For this was a garden, like none other; made perfectly for people, like none other. As you might expect, this garden included lots of green, growing plants. Some were beautiful to look at, others were loaded with delicious, juicy fruit. There was a river that wound through the garden that provided the plants and Adam and Eve with refreshing water. Adam and Eve never needed to be hungry or thirsty in their garden home. God had provided all that they needed.

Life in the garden wasn't boring for Adam and Eve either. The Garden was home to many of God's other creatures, too. Animals, birds, and bugs frolicked and nested there, too. God gave the animals and garden to Adam and Eve to take care of. What wonderful work it was for Adam and Eve! All the plants and the animals lived happily under their care. They could look forward to years of making the garden bigger and bigger until all the world God had given them came under their skillful care—just as God had commanded them. What a pleasant future that was to look forward to!

But the best part of the Garden was nothing you could see, smell or touch. It was the perfect fellowship Adam and Eve enjoyed there with each other and with God. Adam took perfect care of Eve. Eve loved obeying and helping Adam. And they together, they both were satisfied in the amazing love of God. Good food! Good work! Good fellowship! How wonderful it all was! The Bible describes the wonderful fellowship that Adam and Eve had with each other and with God in a way that might sound funny to you. It says that when Adam and Eve lived in the Garden, they were "naked and unashamed."

Now when we think of naked, we think of someone who doesn't cover up their body with clothes. And while it's true that Adam and Eve wore no clothes, that's not really all there was to that funny description. It's also talking

about a nakedness of their hearts.

What in the world does that mean? Well, it means that their hearts were so completely good, completely honest and completely loving, that they never had anything to hide from each other or from God. That's why the Bible calls the fellowship they had with each other "naked and unashamed." And perhaps it wouldn't surprise you to know that it is the most wonderful way imaginable to live.

God offered this incredible kind of life to Adam and Eve, not just for seventy or a hundred years, but for forever! In the middle of the Garden He placed two very special trees: one called the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil; and the other called the Tree of Life. God warned Adam and Eve not to eat from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, or they would die. But, if they lived in obedience to Him, He would give them the gift of eternal life. There would never be a time when they would not enjoy wonderful, perfect fellowship with Him and with each other. They would have children, too, who would get to enjoy and fill the earth with their love for each other and praise of God. How great was God's love for His people! He had offered them such a delightful life!

But something very terrible happened on the day of our story. Adam and Eve were no longer naked and unashamed, neither in their bodies nor in their hearts. They had cut the large leaves off of a fig tree and sewn them together as clothes to cover their bodies. And then, instead of eagerly awaiting fellowship time with God when He came to the Garden in the cool of the day, they hid themselves among the trees, hoping He would not find them.

How do you hide from someone who sees all and knows all? You can't! It's impossible! God had seen everything that had happened that day. He had watched them listen to the tempting lies Satan spoke to them through the serpent. He had felt dissatisfaction and rebellion grow in their hearts. Adam and Eve did not just disobey God once and stop. They had become sinners with sinful hearts that rebelled against God again and again. But sin didn't stop with Adam and Eve. They passed down the consequences of their sin to all their children.

Each and every one of us come from Adam and Eve's family--we are all their children. And because we are their children, we are all born sinners with sinful hearts and with bodies that will suffer and die. And also like Adam and Eve, we all deserve eternal punishment for our sins, too.

Yet God, in His great mercy, always planned to send His Son Jesus to save His sinful people by taking the punishment for their sins upon Himself. Jesus did this when He suffered and died on the cross. On the third day, He rose from the dead, showing He had beaten sin and death.

God promises to forgive all who confess their sins to Him and trust in Jesus as their Savior. He will give them each a new heart, filled with His Holy Spirit--a heart that knows and loves Him more and more. And one day, when they die, they will not receive the eternal punishment they deserve for their sins, but eternal life with God forever. How great is God's mercy through Jesus to sinful people like us!

The Case of the Gift No One Wanted.

Our story today takes place back in the beginning, when Adam and Eve rebelled against God.

What a terrible day it had been! How much Adam and Eve had lost! Their beautiful garden home, the pureness of love in their hearts; and all the dreams of unending, perfect life with God in the beautiful world He had made for them. How sweet had in been inside the Garden, in perfect fellowship with God and each other! And how sad it was already, outside the Garden, out of perfect fellowship with God and each other.

Sad, it was; but, there was no getting around it. This was the new normal. So, Adam and Eve set out to live in the world outside the Garden, armed with nothing more than the animal skin clothes that God had mercifully made them.

It didn't take long for Adam and Eve to see the effects of their sin, both upon themselves and the world around them. What would it be like to see the curse of sin slowly ruin every part of God's perfect creation and know it was your fault? Horrible, I imagine. Well, that is exactly what Adam and Eve faced the day they were sent out of the Garden!

Because of their sinful choices, Adam now had to fight weeds and thorns that choked the food crops he tried to grow. He had to fight off animals that now had turned wild and fierce. With pain, Eve gave birth to her sons, Cain and Abel. Both Adam and Eve felt an awful selfishness and wickedness grow in their hearts. It was all just as God had said it would be, and oh, how terrible it was to bear the consequences of their sin!

Adam and Eve hated the choices they made and they hated Satan for tempting them to rebel against God; but now there was nothing they could do. Nothing, that is, except have faith in God's promises. And that is what they did.

Adam showed his faith as he named his wife, Eve—the mother of the living. He believed God's promise to give

Eve children who would fight against sin and strive to love God. He believed that one day, one of these children would be the promised Savior who would bring Life--eternal life--to God's people by crushing Satan's power.

Eve showed her faith at the birth of her first son, Cain. "With the LORD's help I have brought forth a man," she exclaimed. She could see that God had begun to fulfill His promises to them. Cain was the first child of many to come into the world. One of them, Eve believed, would be the Savior God would send to defeat Satan once and for all.

God never told them how long they would have to wait for this special son of hers who would crush Satan. But Adam and Eve believed the Savior would come. They knew how good and merciful God was. They knew how much He loved them. Perhaps they even thought that Cain or Abel might be the promised Savior.

But if they did, it became clear all too quickly that neither these boys were not the Savior! Even while the boys were just young children, Adam and Eve could see that the hearts of Cain and Abel were filled with selfishness and wickedness. No. Eve had not given birth to a Savior; she had given birth to more sinful people who needed saving, just like themselves. Adam and Eve had passed their sin down to their children!

But if Adam and Eve passed down their sin, there was something else they could pass down, too: the promises of God. They could tell Cain and Abel of the perfect world they had known and of the perfect fellowship with God and each other they had shared. They could tell them of the serpent's tricks, of their sinful choices and how their sin meant they would die. But they could comfort them with God's promise to send a Savior to crush Satan one day. They could never be sinless themselves here on earth, but they could become children of God's promise and be saved through faith in Him.

Abel must have listened to Adam and Eve and believed. He knew he was a sinner like his parents and had no hope other than God for salvation. He was a child of the Promise. He looked forward in faith to the day God would send the promised Savior. Abel was a keeper of flocks—sheep and goats. When his animals gave birth to their firstborn, Abel would look among the new little animals for the best, the fattest, most perfect ones to present to God. God looked on Abel's sacrifice and saw how it reflected Abel's heart. Yes, it was a heart full of sin, but it was also full of desire to honor God above all else and trust in Him for salvation. The

LORD accepted Abel's offering and counted him as righteous—clean of sin through his faith in God.

But then there was Cain. Cain would have heard the same stories about God as Abel did. He would have known the same promises of a Savior God had made to them. And he certainly felt the same tug of sinful desires in his heart. But unlike Abel, Cain refused to believe. Cain was a farmer. And yes, Cain made offerings to God from the crops he grew, but he did not make sure to give God the first and best of his crops. He only gave Him "some" of his crops, and held back the best for himself. Cain did not honor the LORD in his heart or with his life.

When the LORD warned Adam and Eve about the "offspring of the serpent" that would be their enemies, it wasn't baby serpents or baby Satans (angels/demons can't even have children) that the LORD was speaking of. He was talking about people, like Cain, who would hold on to their sin and rebellion instead of turning to faith in God. These people would fight God and against the people who put their faith in God.

God looked at Cain's offering and saw right into Cain's unworshipful heart. He rejected his offering. This made Cain furious! He walked away from the altar downcast. God had accepted his brother Abel's offering, but refused his!

Then the LORD said to Cain: Then the LORD said to Cain, "Why are you angry? Why is your face downcast? If you do what is right, will you not be accepted? But if you don't do what is right, sin is waiting for you, it wants to have you, but you must master it." (Genesis 4:6-7) God was making it clear: He would accept Cain and his sacrifice if Cain would repent of his sin and worship God in his heart and with his first fruits. God was warning Cain to turn from the sinful desires of his heart and trust in Him that he might be saved.

But there was to be no turning in Cain. Cain didn't want to master his evil desires. He wanted to give in to them. Cain invited Abel to go out in the field with him, then attacked him and killed him! Instead of mastering the sin that tempted him, Cain had allowed his sin to master him. He had murdered someone—the very first murder in the world.

Much like He had done with Adam and Eve after they had sinned in the Garden, the LORD now came to question Cain: "Where is your brother Abel?" the LORD asked Cain.

"I don't know. Am I supposed to know where he is all the time? Am I my brother's keeper?" Cain lied, trying to hide

his sin, just like his parents had before him.

But nothing can be hidden from God. The LORD revealed what Cain wanted to hide, then gave him his punishment.

"What have you done?" the LORD said to Cain. "Listen! Your brother's blood cries out to me from the ground. Now you are under a curse and driven from the ground, which opened its mouth to receive your brother's blood from your hand. When you work the ground, it will no longer yield its crops for you. You will be a restless wanderer on the earth.

"LORD, "my punishment is more than I can bear," Cain cried out. "Today You are driving me from the land, hidden from your presence; I will be a restless wanderer on the earth, and whoever finds me will kill me," Cain groaned. Cain didn't like his punishment, but never once did he confess his sin and ask God's forgiveness. How hard and selfish his heart was!

Yet even to this hard-hearted man God once more showed mercy. Cain had killed his very own brother. He deserved to be killed himself; but instead the LORD told him: "Not so; if anyone kills Cain, he will be punished himself seven times more than you." Then LORD put a mark on Cain so that no one who found him would kill him. So Cain went out from the LORD's presence and lived in the land of Nod, east of Eden.

Cain was to be only the first of a long line of sinful children of Adam and Eve who each chose to reject God and His merciful offer of salvation. Until Jesus comes back at the end of time, there will always be unrepentant sinners like him.

But what of God's promise that there would also be a long line of sinful children of Adam and Eve who would turn from their sins and have faith in God? What about these children of God's Promise, as they are called? Adam and Eve had lost both sons in a single day: one murdered and one sent away to wander far from them and from God all the days of his life. Would there be no more children of the Promise? And what of God's promise to send a Savior? How could there be a Savior with no children?

God in His faithfulness and mercy gave Adam and Eve another son, a boy named Seth. And though Seth was of course a sinner, he was a child of the Promise, too. Like Abel, he called upon the name of the LORD. He loved God and looked forward in faith to the promised Savior that God would send. Here was a son, through which God

would bring even more children. Here was a son through whom God would even send Jesus one day, to crush Satan's power and bring salvation. And of course, that is just what the LORD did, just as He promised He would, at just the right time, to save all who turn from their sins and trust in Him as their own Savior. How faithful God is to His sinful people!

Let's praise God for mercifully making a way to save us through the Savior Jesus. Let's ask Him to soften our hearts and the hearts of all children of Adam and Eve to turn in faith to Him.

And one day, when they die, they will not receive the eternal punishment they deserve for their sins, but eternal life with God forever. How great is God's mercy through Jesus to sinful people like us!

CASE STORY

Our story is called:

The Case of the Unsinkable Message. As you listen to the story, see if you can figure out:

This story doesn't take place in Bible times. It takes place in the 1912, beginning in Glasgow, Scotland.

Glasgow was a big city built on beautiful, misty hills, next to the River Clyde. But while the hills and river reflected the beauty of God's creation, the city itself sadly reflected the sin and suffering that came into the world when Adam and Eve rebelled against God, long ago.

Many of the people of Glasgow were miserably poor. Large families were crowded into small, dirty apartments, without even a bathroom. Most men, women, and even children worked long hours, six days a week, in factories which everything from giant ships and train tracks to textiles (fabric and clothes making) and lace. The long hours in terrible conditions paid very little and made many sick.

In their hearts, the people of Glasgow suffered, too. God had created them to find their joy and comfort in Him; but like all humans since Adam and Eve, these people had broken fellowship with Him. Instead of turning to God to help them and save them, they turned to gambling, cussing, prize fighting and getting drunk on beer and whiskey as a way to deal with their sorrows.

Many people didn't even try to help the poor of Glasgow. They looked at their run-down houses and their bad habits and wanted nothing to do with them. "There's no hope for these people! Why should we bother? Nothing can change them," they thought.

But there were some in Glasgow who disagreed, especially a man named John Harper. "Yes," said John, "these poor people live sad and sinful lives, but so have all people, since the time when Adam and Eve rebelled against God. There's no way that we can save them, but God can. He promised Adam and Eve He would send a Savior to crush Satan. His promise was for all who turn from their sins and believe in the LORD Jesus Christ. I'm going to tell these poor people of about Jesus. I'm going to pray to God to save them." John had a heart to do one

thing and to do it to the end. He worked bring people out of lives filled with sin and death to wonderful fellowship with God through Jesus-- including those poor people of Glasgow.

John began to wait by the factory gates for the people at lunchtime. As they ate their bread and butter sandwiches, he told them about Jesus. He went to their shabby houses as well as the places where they drank, gambled and watched prize fighters, and he told them about Jesus there, too. He invited them to come to his church and prayed over every seat, in one by one, that God would fill it on with someone who turn from their sins and trust in Jesus as their Savior.

God blessed John's efforts. Many people were saved. Their lives were still very hard, but God filled their hearts with joy and peace. They were changed people!

God used John mightily and soon, other churches invited him to speak to them, too. One church in Chicago asked him to come preach for three whole months. John believed the LORD wanted him to go. He booked tickets for him and his little daughter, Nana, to sail to New York on none other than the Titanic, the amazing new ship about to set sail to America for the first time.

When John and Nana boarded the Titanic, it was more than they imagined. It was the largest man-made, movable object ever built, and the most powerful ship in the world! It was 883 feet high—about as tall as an eleven-story building. It carried over 800 crew and 1200 passengers. Best of all, White Star, the company who owned the ship, claimed that the new, watertight compartments made the ship unsinkable. One crew member even boasted that not even God Himself could sink the ship!

The Titanic wasn't just big and safe; it was elegant as well. The drawing rooms had crystal chandeliers and people dined off of plates of finest china and gold. There were steamy Turkish baths, mechanical camels and horses to ride, beautiful fireplaces in the rooms, and the first swimming pool ever put on a boat, but only the first-class passengers (who paid \$55,000 per ticket!!!) could use them. There were plenty of those very wealthy people on board the Titanic that day. Benjamin Guggenheim, whose money came from iron factories; Molly Brown, the woman who had grown rich from gold mines in Colorado; Mr. Straus, the owner of Macy's department store along with his wife were there. Even Colonel John Jacob Astor, the

richest man in the world had reserved a room.

John and Nana knew they wouldn't get to do the special things reserved for the very rich, but they would get a peak at them. What a parade of mink coats and jewels it was! But as amazing as the Titanic and its rich passengers were, John thought of only one thing: "These people are lost. Riches won't satisfy them any more than the drinking, gambling and prize fighting could satisfy the poor people of Glasgow. Their lives are hopelessly bound up in sin and suffering, too. They need the Savior Jesus. I'm going to spend this trip praying and telling them about Him, that they might be saved.

God answered John's prayers, for it was for that very reason that God wanted John on that boat, as John was to see, late on the fourth night of the voyage.

The fourth night started out like any other night on the Titanic. Up in the elegant drawing rooms, the rich passengers were dining and dancing. And then at eleven p.m., everything changed. The crew spotted a monstrous, 200,000 ton iceberg straight ahead! The iceberg rammed into the ship's side, causing a huge shower of ice shavings on deck. Many enjoyed the near miss; some even reached out to take ice from the iceberg to put in their drinks. They had no idea that the iceberg had sliced a huge hole in the ship.

"There's a huge tear on the hull," the anxious crew told Captain Smith. "Six of the watertight compartments are filling with water. What should we do?"

"Seal them off. We must keep the water from spreading to the rest of the ship," the captain commanded.

But it was no use. By a little after midnight, the captain knew the ship was going down. "Shoot off the flares! Muster the lifeboats! Alert the passengers! The Titanic will sink in just a couple hours!" he ordered them.

As the word spread, the passengers broke out into a panic. Everyone began to scramble for the lifeboats, only to find out that there were only enough boats for a few hundred of the 2000 people aboard the ship. Women and children would be boarded first, it was decided. Any remaining spots would be given to men. The rest of the people would have to find someway to survive on floating wreckage in the freezing water...or go down with the ship. Some men did not like this. One man even dressed up like a woman to try to get on a boat. Others stole boats for themselves.

But what about John and Nana? What did they do as the Titanic began to sink? As soon as the alarm was sounded, John knew what the LORD would have him do. The LORD had not sent him on this journey to preach to lost people in Chicago; He had sent him to preach to lost people on the Titanic, that they might be saved for eternal life.

John kissed his daughter with a heart-breaking goodbye, put her in safe hands on one of the lifeboats, and then went to work sharing the good news of Jesus. As he helped people scrambling to the boats he asked, "Do you know Jesus? Are you saved?"

"No," was answer from most.

"Then believe on the LORD Jesus Christ. And you will be saved. It is not too late!" he urged them.

Soon, all the lifeboats were full. That left more than 1500 people still on board. Many panicked as they faced the thought of dying in the icy waters, but not John. He had a heart to do one thing: tell the good news of Jesus to as many as he could! There was no lifeboat to save them for this life, but there was a Savior who could save them for all eternity! That was even better!

"Believe on the LORD Jesus Christ and you shall be saved! Believe on the LORD Jesus Christ and you shall be saved," he told all who would listen.

Before long, the Titanic's stern tipped high in the sky, and then the mighty ship slid down into the ocean.

Passengers joined hands and leaped into the bitterly cold waters. John was among those in the icy waters. John knew he would not survive long in those freezing waters, but still he didn't panic. He knew he was saved. Soon he would be with Jesus forever. His only thought for those who were about to die and were not saved. Even in the water, John kept on preaching. A man clinging to a piece of wood floated near John. "Man, are you saved?" John called out. "No, I am not," the man replied. "Then believe on the LORD Jesus Christ and you shall be saved!" John urged him.

Before the man could answer, a wave swept him away. Before long, though, another wave swept him near again. John called to him again, "Man are you saved now?" "No, sir. I am not." So again, John urged him once more, "Believe on the LORD Jesus Christ and you shall be saved."

With that last plea upon his lips, the cold overtook him. John's body slipped into the deep and he died, but his spirit went up into the glorious presence of His beloved LORD Jesus Christ, who he had proclaimed even with his

last breath. Little did John know that the man clinging to the wood accepted Jesus.

John had a heart to do one thing and to do it to the end. He labored to bring people out of lives filled with sin and death to wonderful fellowship with God through Jesus--even with his last, dying breath.

The news of the sinking of the Titanic shocked the world. Outside the door of the White Star office crowded anxious friends and family of passengers around two lists posted. On one list was written: "Known to Be Lost." On the other, "Known to Be Saved." Cries of relief or horror went up as the names of loved ones were found on the lists.

John Harper's name appeared on the White Star's "Known to Be Lost" list, for indeed he had been lost to the sea. Many people mourned at the loss of such a wonderful man of God. But there was rejoicing in heaven, as not only John but many others on White Star's lists had believed on the LORD Jesus Christ and were Known to Be Saved from their sins and for eternal life with God.

This story takes place in New Testament times, right after Jesus died on the cross and rose from the dead.

Watch and wait! Watch and wait! That's what God's people had been doing for years and years, since the day Adam and Eve rebelled against God. What had they been watching and waiting for? For God's promises to send a Savior to crush Satan and bring salvation. Oh, how they longed for their enemies of sin and death to be defeated!

Now, at last, it seemed that the day they had been watching and waiting for had come. Jesus had died on the cross three days earlier, and now today--on the day we call Easter Sunday--there were all sorts of amazing stories that Jesus had risen from the dead. The disciples gathered together to eat their fish dinner and to talk about all that had happened. There was the empty tomb where Jesus' body had lay. There was the angel who told the women Jesus had risen. There was Mary Magdalene and Peter and Cleopas who all saw Him. Yes, as incredible as it was, it seemed true!

Then, while they were still talking about this, Jesus himself suddenly stood among them. "Peace be with you," He said to them all. "It's the ghost of Jesus!" the terrified disciples thought.

"Why are you worried? Why do you doubt," Jesus asked them. "Look at my hands and my feet. It's me!! Touch me and see; a ghost doesn't have flesh and bones, I have," He said, holding out his hands and feet. 'Do you have anything to eat?' Jesus asked them.

They gave him a piece of the broiled fish. He took it and ate it. No, this was no ghost! This was Jesus! He was really alive! They were filled with joy and amazement! But Jesus didn't just drop by to eat. He came to teach them. He came to show them all the Scriptures said about Him. "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about

Me in God's Word," Jesus reminded them. Then He led them through the Bible, explaining all the promises about His coming. Yes, it was true! He had fulfilled them all! He was the one God's people had for years been watching for and waiting to come. At last Satan had been crushed.

At last the way out of sin and death and the way into fellowship with God forever had been opened up. It was God's free gift to all who would ever turn away from their sins and trust in Jesus as their Savior.

Yes, now the years of watching and waiting were over. Now God was giving His people something new to do. Now it was time to show and tell the world the good news of salvation.

"Be My witnesses Show God's power! Tell others the good news of salvation! Tell them how to be My followers!" Jesus told His disciples. "Start here in Jerusalem, then keep on going: to Samaria, Judea and even the ends of the earth, that the whole world might know," Jesus said.

And how would they have the power to do this? Jesus told them that, too. "God, My Father, will send you the gift of the Holy Spirit inside your heart to help you. He will give you boldness to tell others about Me. The time of waiting and watching is over. Now is the time to show and tell so that God's people, the Church, will be built among all peoples on earth."

The disciples were overjoyed. This was wonderful! It was really true! Jesus died on the cross, but now He had risen from the dead! He, the Son of God, had crushed Satan! He had broken the power of sin and death that had held all people captive since the time of Adam and Eve. Now He was building His Church--God's people, from every people on earth. He was calling them to show and tell the world this good news!

Just six week later, on the day of Pentecost, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit into the hearts of the waiting disciples just as He had promised. "Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them." (Acts 2:2-4)

Now it was time. Time to show and time to tell the world the good news of Jesus. The disciples poured out of the house and into the street, and began telling the good news in Latin, in Egyptian, in Arabic, in Greek, in Persian, and in many other languages the disciples all began to tell the good news:

"Jesus died on the cross, but now has risen from the dead! Jesus, the Son of God, has crushed Satan!" disciples

told all who would listen. "He has broken the power of sin and death that had held all people captive since the time of Adam and Eve. He is doing a new thing. He is setting up His Kingdom; His building His Church from every people on earth. Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. All who turn from their sins and trust in Jesus will be saved!"

Thousands of people, from many nations, listened to the disciples that day and were amazed. "How is it that each of us hears them declaring the wonders of God in our own language? What does this mean?" they wondered.

Peter stood up and told them: "These are all signs that the promised Savior we have watched and waited for has come. Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off—for all whom the LORD our God will call."

Then God did something even more powerful than the signs that day. He worked in the hearts of many and about three thousand people turned from their sins and trusted in Jesus.

How the disciples rejoiced that night! God was working powerfully through them as they showed and told the good news of Jesus.

But Jesus had told His disciples not to just stay in Jerusalem, but to go out into Judea, Samaria and to the ends of the earth; and so they did, each time showing and telling the good news of salvation.

In Joppa, a city in nearby Judea, Peter went to show and tell. He showed Jesus' power over death as he raised Tabitha from the dead in Jesus' name. He told the gathered crowd the good news of Jesus and God again worked in hearts and many turned from their sins and trusted in Jesus.

Philip went further away to the Jews' hated neighbors, the Samaritans, to show Jesus' power and to tell the good news of salvation. In the name of Jesus, Philip healed many people, showing them Jesus' power over sin and evil. "These things that I do are signs from God that show Jesus is God's Son, the Savior, come to save all who turn from their sins and trust in Jesus-- even you Samaritans," he told them. Many saw the signs and heard Philip's words, and again many believed on Jesus and were saved.

Further and further away from Jerusalem believers traveled, just like Jesus told them to. The whole world needed to hear about salvation through Jesus! Paul traveled to Turkey, to Malta, to Greece to Italy and even Spain. Everywhere he went he showed Jesus' power through miracles and he told the people the good news of salvation through Jesus.

In Lystra, Turkey, Paul healed a lame man who had never ever walked, in the power of Jesus' name. On the island of Malta, the LORD healed Paul from a poisonous bite of a deadly viper hiding in firewood. In Ephesus, God did extraordinary miracles through Paul, so that even handkerchiefs and aprons that had touched him were taken to the sick, and their illnesses were cured. Again God worked in hearts and many were saved. And In Rome, Italy Paul even got to tell the good news of Jesus to Caesar, the Roman king, himself.

On and on since then, God's people keep on obeying Jesus' command to Show and Tell. And on and on, God keeps working through His Holy Spirit and His people to free people from the terrible bondage of sin and death passed down to us all through Adam and Eve.

These days, God does not choose to use the great fireworks of incredible miracles to show His mighty power as much as He did in those first days of the disciples (though He is just as able to). But He does work still, every bit as powerfully in the hearts of all who turn from their sins and trust in Jesus as their Savior.

And on one, amazing day, Jesus will come again and bring an end to all sin and death forever for God's people. On that day, the sin that began with Satan and Adam and Eve long ago, will be completely and finally done away with, never to spread again! Then, for God's people, there will only be eternal life, enjoying God and each other forever. How wonderful that will be!
